

#### From the Pastor's Desk

### "I Predict. . . . God Is Faithful!"

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. Proverbs 3:5

Here's a front-page headline from a few years ago: According to USA Today, scientists are going way out on a limb and predicting the state of California will be rocked by a strong earthquake before the year 2037.

When I first became aware of that headline I thought, I'm in the wrong line of work; I need to go into the prediction business. If you're wondering how I'd do, I'd like to submit my first batch of prognostications:

- 1. I predict it is going to rain in Seattle before the end of 2023
- 2. I predict Death Valley will, for the most part, remain dry.
- 3. I predict a Missouri Synod-Lutheran Church will have a voter's meeting that will run longer than thirty minutes.
- 4. I predict a pastor will pick a hymn somebody in the church will not like.

Those are my predictions, and I'm ready to stand by them.

As silly as those predictions are, they're no sillier than promising an earthquake will hit California in the next two decades, and my predictions are less silly than the psychics who, a few years ago, apparently couldn't predict the Psychic Friends Network was going to go bankrupt.

The truth is this: nobody knows what the future holds. We don't know if our days will be many or few; we don't know if we are going to be healthy, wealthy, or wise.

Christians who know their limitations trust the Savior. We who have seen God's grace in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, find peace and contentment knowing that no matter what may come the Lord – who has made us and saved us – will keep us.

That's the promise He made thousands of years ago. It's the promise He has faithfully kept over the centuries and that He keeps even now. Equipped with that knowledge, we can take any and every problem to the Lord in prayer.

THE PRAYER: Dear heavenly Father, this sinful world is a difficult place in which to live. There are pressures, problems, and pains. These dark and evil things that beset us we turn over to You. We know, according to Your promise, You will hear our call and deliver us. This You will do because of Jesus, our Savior and Intercessor. In His Name we pray. AMEN.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Alleluia! Christ is risen! No news greater than that! In fact, that puts a wrap on the entire story.

On Saturday morning, April 2 in 2022, some dear friends from our church came together with us at the site where our house once stood in Wears Valley (Sevierville, TN). They came to help us dig through the ruins, sifting through the ashes, in hopes of finding something remaining—something of memories and times-gone-by. Among what very little was found, there were pieces of broken plates and cups, blackened and broken pottery, once beautiful, hand-crafted chalices and patens (made and given to me through the years). All broken.

It was how we felt, too, after that disastrous fire of March 30th that completely destroyed our house (and my car). We tried to pray, but so often could not even find, much less speak, the words. We were broken.

But in the midst of our brokenness and out of those very ashes, pure gold was found—in fact, the purest gold ever!

"Kintsugi" is a Japanese word for a venerable, long-standing tradition within that culture where broken ceramics and pottery are reconnected using a specially-formulated Japanese lacquer and pure gold. Down through the centuries, it has become a highly-specialized artistic endeavor, resulting in exquisite beauty. Imagine it: a once-beautiful cup broken to bits, but pieced back together with gold joining the broken pieces, something once-whole and beautiful put back together to be even more beautiful and more precious!

Into our lives over these weeks and months, the Lord has poured gold: pure gold. You, our dear brothers and sisters, are that gold that He has poured into our broken hearts. Your words and hugs, your notes and emails, your boundless kindness and generosity—your help—it was all pure gold poured out on us by God through you.

The Lord has surely used you to heal us during these difficult days, these times of great loss. Out of the ashes He has shown the beauty and tenderness of His love for us. He is putting the broken pieces back together, and—what we should always know!—He is lavish in His love and over-the-top in the ways and works of His mercy toward us. Pure gold!

Thank you for your prayers and for all of the many, many ways you reached out to us to comfort and to help. Thank you for a generosity that is beyond our understanding—your hearts poured out lavish kindness! You are one and all God's pure gold!

We've reached the decision that we will not rebuild on our property in Wears Valley, even as we know its beauty and recall our joy in the years we were able to spend there. God blessed us so richly in enabling us to live in that part of His creation all these years—oh how we loved it! Precious and many wonderful memories we have! However, the decision-making required in the building of a new house (in this current economic climate) is not something that we feel we're able to handle at this stage of our lives.

Making our way through the insurance process of our household inventory was all but mind-numbing! Remembering everything in every drawer and cabinet and closet and when you acquired it and what it probably cost when you acquired it and what it would probably cost now and... If anything, this lengthy process prolonged the time of great sadness remembering those things most precious to us: photos of our kids growing up, a private visitation Communion kit given me by a faithful Lutheran pastor who lived to be 101, favorite pieces of pottery, a ring given Jean belonging to her grand-mother... the list goes on.

A few months ago, with the great help of a member of our congregation in Knoxville (also a realtor), we managed to (finally) locate and purchase a small condo. It's located in north Knoxville, only about 15 minutes from our church. We're still in the process of furnishing it, but it's already quite comfortable for us.

Daily our Lord continues teaching us, leading us, shaping us for the days ahead, and those "days ahead" will be good. That we know.

We know it because "the Lord is risen, indeed-alleluia!" Just think of that! Out of the ashes, pure gold. Beyond any imagination.


#### What is Cityscape Photography?

## THE IMMANUEL LUTHERAN FOUNDATION Call for Grant and Scholarship Applications



Thanks to a generous gift, the Immanuel Lutheran Foundation has been serving diverse needs of the Immanuel Lutheran Church since 1997. This "General Fund" has provided financial support through a Grant Application Process to do those important "non-budgeted" things "for which we never seemed to have the money."

While the Foundation's General Fund earnings are directed to the support of *non-budgeted items*, the earnings of the Westfall Endowment Funds established some years later are directed to specific needs. These include; local expenses, school expenses, and the maintenance and upkeep of Immanuel Lutheran Church. Provisions have also been made to award five scholarships each year. One is offered to an Immanuel member entering "Preaching and Teaching" ministries of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. Four are available to members of Immanuel and/or graduates of the Immanuel Lutheran School enrolled in an accredited College or University with a preference given to applicants aspiring to enter the ministry, or a career in medicine, law, or engineering.

#### From the Principal's Desk


Dear Immanuel Lutheran Church Members and Friends,

I am happy to report that Immanuel Lutheran School has been re-accredited for another five years through the National Lutheran School Association. The visitation team members came from Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Connecticut. Pastor Rowold, from Cheshire Lutheran Church, served as the pastor on the team. The group was on site for three days. They saw most of the classes, visited with all of the staff and many students as well.

There are upcoming May field trips for all grade levels. PK3 and PK4 will travel to Torrington to PlayCity, a play adventure geared toward young children. On May 5, students in Kindergarten through 3rd grade will go to the Beardsley Zoo in Bridgeport. Students in grades 4-8 will travel to Groton to participate in Project Oceanology to study water chemistry and ecology in late May. Grades 7 and 8 will go on the biannual Washington DC Trip May 21-26. We have a very full month of May ahead!

We conduct annual testing in May. This year we are changing to the Iowa Test of Basic Skills (ITBS) from the Stanford we used for many years. We believe the ITBS will be a useful tool in planning curriculum changes and monitoring student growth.
