From the Pastor's Desk

"This Is Love"

(Jesus said) "This is My commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. Greater love has no one than this, that someone lays down his life for his friends." John 15:12-13

You probably don't know John Baca.

Even so, for many he's a poster boy for this month's Valentine's Day.

Born in January of 1949, Baca grew up in San Diego. I'd love to say he was always a good kid, but the truth is he was in and out of juvenile hall numerous times. Eventually, he fulfilled the conditions of his parole and was drafted into the military.

On February 10, 1970, Baca led his unit through intense fire to rescue a platoon, which was pinned down. Successful in setting up a protected firing position, Baca and his pals started to fight back. That was when a fragmentation grenade was thrown into the middle of him and his pals. Without hesitation, Baca covered the grenade with his helmet and covered his helmet with his body.

On top of his helmet – that's where Baca was when the grenade exploded.

That was love. No, that's not the smoochy-smoochy kind of love most people celebrate this month. It's not the candy or the flowers or the candlelight dinner kind of love most will share.

It's the kind of love, which on June 15, 1971, had the Medal of Honor bestowed on John Baca

It's also the kind of love the Lord spoke about in John, chapter 15 – the kind of love that's willing to die for a friend.

That's the kind of love John Baca had. It's certainly the love that Jesus has.

No, that's not quite right. Jesus has a love that's far greater than that of John Baca. You see, while Baca was ready to die for his friends, he was also willing to shoot at his enemies. Jesus was crucified for those who loved Him, but also for those who hated Him, who mocked Him, spit on Him, whipped Him and beat Him.

He also died to save sinners like you and me.

This is why even as we celebrate God's blessed gift of earthly love, we also give thanks for the fact God so loved the sinful world He gave His only Son.

PRAYER: Dear Lord, today we give thanks for the many people who have loved us. We also wish to express gratitude for the opportunity of showing love to others. Most of all we're moved by the love of the Savior who gave His life so we might be forgiven and live forever. May we reflect such a selfless, giving love to others. In Jesus' Name we pray it. Amen.

During Lent we prepare our hearts to receive our crucified and risen Lord by...

Decorating the church using violet. Violet, the color of royalty and repentance, is the color for Lent. In biblical times, violet dye was very expensive and could only be purchased by royalty or the very rich. The people of God our His royal priesthood (1 Peter 2:8-9). We decorate the church in the royal color of violet for our times of repentance — turning away from our sins and turning toward Christ for His mercy and forgiveness.

No longer singing Alleluia. Alleluia is a Hebrew word that means "Praise the Lord." It appears often in the Psalms and is a joyous expression of faith in God. During Lent, we do not use this joyous response in order to focus on our need for repentance and faith.

No longer singing the Gloria in Excelsis. Just as in Advent, so in Lent we give up singing the joyous Hymn of Praise. We do this to focus our worship on repentance.

Lent is a season that has a number of interesting customs: Ash Wednesday and the Imposition of Ashes. Lent always begins 40 weekdays before Easter on Ash Wednesday. The name comes from the ancient custom of the imposition of ashes. The pastor dips his thumb into some ashes (traditionally made from the palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday) and

marks an ashy cross on each person's forehead while saying, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This custom uses the biblical image of ashes (Job 42:6) to remind us that we, too, shall die and therefore need forgiveness from Jesus.

Fasting. Fasting is giving up eating at a particular meal or time in order to devote that time to prayer and meditation on the Word of God. Jesus directed that His disciples would fast (Matthew 6:16-18), and the Small Catechism says that fasting is "fine outward training" before taking the Lord's Supper. Many Christians use Lent as a special time of fasting — especially on Fridays in remembrance of Good Friday when Jesus died on the cross.

Giving something up for Lent. It's similar to fasting, except instead of a meal a person might "give up" any favorite item: a toy, television, desserts, etc. The idea behind giving something up for Lent is to be reminded to pray, to study God's Word, and to think of Jesus' sacrifice when you miss the thing that you have given up.

Midweek services. Many churches observe Lent with special midweek services. These extra times of worship during the week help us to hear God's Word and prepare us to observe Holy Week and celebrate Easter.






Lamb on the Book
