From the Pastor's Desk "Thanks for What?"

Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice, and let them say among the nations, "The LORD Reigns!" Let the sea roar, and all that fills it; let the field exult, and everything in it! Then shall the trees of the forest sing for joy before the LORD, for He comes to judge the earth. Oh give thanks to the LORD, for He is good; for His steadfast love endures forever! 1 Chronicles 16:31-34

This month, America stops to count its blessings.

Actually, I should say this month is when most Americans count their blessings. I say most, because, according to a study done by LifeWay Research, there are those who just don't do a lot of thanking. Instead, their survey said that seven percent of Americans don't offer up any thanks on Thanksgiving Day. Another four percent said they don't thank God, or family, or anybody else, for that matter. Two percent said they have nothing for which to be thankful.

I'll bet they're a lot of fun to have at the holiday table.

That being said, the giving of thanks remains important to the vast majority of our people and, even though the Lord has been insulted by society and shoved to the side by various groups, most of us still give thanks to our God for all He has done for us.

Now that doesn't mean we're all thankful for the same thing. We're not.

For example, if you are 65 or older, you're most likely thankful for family (92 percent) and good health (86 percent). A lot lower on your list would be things like "fun experiences."

On the other hand, if you're 25 or younger, you're likely to value those fun expe-

riences (70 percent) and your own personal achievements (61 percent).

This may lead you to ask, "Is there any common place where age groups come together and show an appreciative attitude?"

The answer is yes. No, it's not in offering thanks for money or a good job. Nor do most folks wish to show their gratitude for friends and a comfortable home.

That which brings together young and old, rich and poor, educated and self-taught is – can you guess – it's family. It's in our families that we do our best and most frequent arguing, but it's also in our families that we find love, understanding and compassion. Maybe that explains why 80 percent of people put "family" at the top of their list.

Following up were things like health (77 percent), personal freedom (72 percent), and friends (71 percent).

Now I know you just have to be dying to find out what was at the bottom of people's lists for appreciation. Well, it's not what you might think. No, occupying the lowest spot is wealth.

Now I don't know how you would have answered those pollsters if they had called you. But I most certainly pray you would have insisted they put "My Savior" onto their list. Truly, if you have the Savior and all the blessings His sacrificial life has won, you have everything you need. Without Him, well, without Him, the other blessings, while still wonderful, somehow don't shine as bright.

THE PRAYER: Dear Lord, may every day of our lives be filled with thanks for our Savior. In His Name. Amen.

In Remembrance of Vern Koch

These messages were sent to Lois in remembrance of Vern. She would like to share a few of them with you.

I've known Vern since meeting him in the summer of 1970. I taught with him for 6 years, sang in his choir, and was often accompanied by him for wedding solos. He holds a cherished page in my memories. With gratitude to God for such a special friend.

We were all blessed to have Vern in our life. I was blessed to have him as a teacher.

I cannot even tell you what a friend Vern was to our whole family, from the time he came to Bristol. So many stories; so many memories. He was one of the great people of the faith. No one lived their faith everyday the way Vern did. He was loved by everyone who knew him.

I had Mr. Koch as a 5th grade teacher in 1968-69, and he made a lasting impact. I became a teacher in part because of him. I will miss running into him around town.

Many of us remember the times we were without a chief shepherd-sometimes for long periods of time and there was Vern — always willing and competently able to step into the breach. One of the sheep assuming the role of chief shepherd during the emergencies. How blest we were! We remember much with exceeding gratitude.

I was a student at Immanuel Lutheran School, when Mr. Koch was principal and attended church when he played the organ. At 22 years old now I still remember him as a wonderful man and impactful example. Once again, I am so sorry for your loss.

Vern was such an inspiration to me and we'd always have the best conversations.

He was a wonderful teacher who really helped me to learn and love music in a way that I hadn't before because I'd always struggled with reading music. I appreciated all that he did for me and I'll cherish those memories of playing bells with him in that 8th grade class forever!

Memories of Vern. Most of all I will remember a man of strong faith who loved his Lord, family, music, organs, friends, and students.

We lost an amazing man, Mr. Koch. But now we will carry on his memory and all the great lessons he taught. Mr. Koch was an incredible friend, mentor and teacher and my life will forever be better for knowing him.

I have so many wonderful memories of Vern. Many of my favorites have to do with our DC Trips. Vern would always enjoy telling the kids stories especially when we reached Gettysburg. It was a joy to see him interact with the kids.

I find it very difficult to put into words my thoughts on my friend Vern. I'm deeply saddened by his passing. He was a true man of unwavering faith in his Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! He demonstrated that faith every day of his life. His life long service to Immanuel Lutheran Church and School is unparalleled in the history of our church. He was a mentor to me in many aspects of my life. Whenever there was a situation or problem at the school or church, I knew I could talk with Vern about it and he always listened thoughtfully and then would give me counsel and advise. What I will miss most is his playing of our magnificent Austin pipe organ. He was a master at those key boards and I learned much from him that helped me to fill in whenever he needed me.

Orphan Grain Train Announces Shipment

Volunteers for the Orphan Grain Train's (OGT) New England Branch, located at 33 South Main St. in Terryville, Ct. loaded a 53 foot container of needed items on Oct. 14 for the hurricane victims in North Carolina, Tennessee, and Virginia. OGT has the use of a warehouse in Terryville that is owned by Mr. Bill Allread, who has made space available for this charitable work

The shipment was sent to the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP), one of our mission partners, which aids those less fortunate over a 12 state area and is headquartered in Kentucky. They will forward the items sent to the affected states and have already sent 12 truckloads into the area. The shipment included an estimated 20,000 pounds of supplies including Hygiene kits, Blankets, Clothing, Layette kits, over 1800 pounds of Food, Tools, Toys, Household items, Beds, 3 Refrigerators, Appliances, Lawn tools, Furniture, Medical supplies, Buckets and Cleanup items. The shipment is scheduled to arrive on Oct. 15 and be offloaded for transport to the affected areas. The Branch also sent a \$5,000 contribution, which was 50% matched by the Thrivent Insurance company, to the National OGT organization which is assembling food shipments into the affected areas.

Other shipments have gone to missions in a number of countries e.g. Liberia, Nicaragua, Ukraine, Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan, Moldova, Lithuania, Latvia, Nepal, the Philippines, Trinidad, Panama, Ghana and the Republic of Georgia, as well as Appalachia and previous hurricane relief for Puerto Rico, Florida and North Carolina. The Branch also helps those locally in New England, giving medical items that have been donated to individuals in need and thru the visiting nurse and hospice care organizations of the area. It has also helped with a shipment to the Bridgeport Rescue Mission.

The effort is an Outreach Ministry of the Lutheran Church, and OGT is a 501(3)(C) charity affiliated with the church and supported locally by Holy Trinity Lutheran in Terryville and Immanuel Lutheran in Bristol and St. Johns in Waterbury and is open to all who want to help others.
