## From the Pastor's Desk

## According to Plan?

Luke 2:6-7 – And while they were there, the time came for her to give birth. And she gave birth to her firstborn Son and wrapped Him in swaddling cloths and laid Him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

How distressed Joseph must have been! He couldn't get a decent place for his wife to lie down, even though she was plainly about to give birth. There was no room in the inn. Whatever relatives they might have had in Bethlehem couldn't give them a bed. By this point, Mary no doubt wanted nothing but a place to lie down – any place, so long as it was horizontal; but her husband wanted better for his wife and her baby.

I wonder what Joseph thought of God's planning at that moment. It surely didn't resemble the kind of planning Joseph wanted! Was he angry? Frightened? Worried? We don't know.

But in God's eyes, everything was going according to plan. Jesus was about to be born in the city of David, in Bethlehem, as God had promised so many years ago: "But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, who are too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for Me One who is to be ruler in Israel, whose coming forth is from of old, from ancient days" (Micah 5:2).

God came into our world as a human baby between the thighs of a woman in temporary housing. We don't even know if Joseph managed to find a midwife to help. Instead of a cedar cradle, Jesus had a manger to sleep in. Instead of silk and cloth of gold, Jesus was wrapped in homely swaddling clothes. This is the birth God planned for Himself as He set in motion His great plan – the plan to redeem us all from the power of death and the devil.

Like Joseph, we too are often distressed when our plans aren't working out – especially when we see our loved ones suffer as a result. But we can take comfort in knowing that God cares for them as He cares for us, and He is working out His plans to save us all – through Jesus, our Savior.

THE PRAYER: Lord, when our plans go wrong, help us to rest in You, trusting that You will see us through. Amen.

## WORK FINALLY GETS OFF THE GROUND

Repairs to the steeple continue. Preliminary work in March and early April stopped water leakages into the building and under bricks. Brickwork was done to replace missing bricks, repaired loose bricks, and secured the steeple enough to make the steeple "safe." More work was scheduled for the summer to fully resolve steeple issues. *Phase 1* of that effort began in mid-October and continues as of this writing. The photographs below illustrate some of the *Phase 1* work. Unfortunately for the viewer but fortunate for the photographer, the photos had to be taken from the ground.

## **Steeple Progress Update - from the Board of Trustees**

## Aluminum steeple

The shell has been inspected, 2 panels were replaced, any loose fittings were replaced. On the inside, the aluminum panels that were installed at some time to keep out water were reattached. A metal flashing has been installed around the exterior perimeter base to keep out water, He feels that the aluminum steeple is now waterproof. Only rainfall will tell for certain.

The new drain has not been installed and the structure has not been anchored securely yet. The new coating of the concrete cap has not occurred. These items are to be completed soon.

#### Mortar/bricks

Brick samples have been sent for analysis.

Engineer has done an aerial inspection. Waiting on report

#### Slate roof

When the lift is being moved, a complete visual inspection will be performed.

#### Windows

Upon removing the old covers, there are areas of concern on several frames that need attention. Specifically rotten wood where water from condensation was trapped and over time the wood has rotted. His proposal is to replace the rotted wood and when installing new lexan, they will leave a weep hole at the base of each window, They will also paint the newly exposed old window frames so that they will conform to the color of the rest of the trim on the church. Dave Poole provided the color.

The church has been given the statement for \$35,725.00. The 1/2 of the total anticipated cost of phase 1.

Memories of dad will forever remain part of my family's life. Father, husband, mentor, grampa, musician, Boy Scout, teacher, principal, technologist, comedian, storyteller, preacher, healer, churchman, organist, pianist, bell ringer, singer, tenor, barbershopper, and photographer. Vernon had a way of living the Gospel message that touched many different people both inside and outside of the church. He loved the Lord and it showed as he lived a life filled with grace and beatitude.

Growing up, it was sometimes difficult to understand why we had to share Dad. There were many late nights and early mornings when he was engaged at the church, school or one of the other community organizations he was involved in. 
## WINTER ICE MELT AVAILABLE
