I would like to give you a brief "State of Immanuel" update. These have been and continue to be uncharted times for all of us. In the midst of all this pandemic and unrest in our country and the world – we place our trust and hope in our Savior.

Exciting things have been happening at Immanuel Lutheran Church and School and I would like to highlight a few:

- We are now live streaming our Divine Service each Sunday and all of our Advent and Lenten mid-week services. These can be viewed on various so-cial media platforms (Facebook, YouTube);
- We are broadcasting each Sunday Divine Service on Nutmeg TV at 10:30am on the following Sunday;

From the Pastor's Desk

Psalm 51: 17

This month many will be celebrating Valentine's Day. A few days later the Christian Church will begin its annual preparation for Easter, as the Season of Lent commences on Ash Wednesday (February 17<sup>th</sup>). Love and Lent – "they go together like two birds of a feather!"

Unfortunately for some, Valentine's Day can be pretty confusing. At least, that's what Reuters News Service reported recently.

For example, eight million Americans admit to sending themselves Valentine gifts. So, if the person in your office has five dozen roses, it may not be from a known or unknown admirer. They just may not want to feel lonely or unloved on Valentine's Day.

Valentine's Day can be confusing. According to a recent phone survey there is a big difference between what people want as a gift for Valentine's Day and what they're probably going to get.

For example, twenty-two percent of the men polled said they were going to give their wives or girlfriends lingerie as a Valentine's Day gift. Lingerie was their top choice. Only two percent of the women said lingerie was a gift they would appreciate.

On the other hand, if you think diamonds are a girl's best friend, you may not be wrong. Jewelry was the top gift choice when the ladies were asked. When the men had their turn of rating gift ideas, jewelry ranked no higher than fifth place.

Valentine's Day can be confusing. For example, the survey says many practical (or cheap) men readily agree when their lady suggests she "really doesn't want a gift this year", or "we don't have to exchange gifts this year for Valentine's Day". Those lines are nothing more than that – lines. Because Valentine's Day is so confusing many relationships have a tough time surviving the day. The survey suggested that three million couples have broken up on Valentine's Day.

This leads me to ask, "What will you give God for Valentine's Day?" We already know what He has given us – His Son. We see the Father's love in Jesus' birth, His life, His suffering, death, and resurrection. Because of Jesus we have been given forgiveness and life eternal. Now the question is, "What shall we give God?"

It's not an easy question, is it? How do you find a present to give Someone who already owns everything? Thankfully we don't have to rack our brains for an answer. In Psalm 51, God says what He wants: a broken and a contrite heart. God wants our repentant, trusting hearts for Valentine's Day, Ash Wednesday... and for everyday.

### The LCMS and COVID-19 Vaccines: Facts and Considerations

### **COVID-19 Vaccines and Abortion**

- Reliable information on the sourcing and testing of COVID-19 vaccines from the pro-life researchers of the Charlotte Lozier Institute may be found at *lozierinstitute.org/update-covid-19-vaccine-candidates-and-abortion-derived-cell-lines/*.
- According to the Lozier Institute, the current FDA-approved COVID-19 vaccines (Pfizer/BioNTech and Moderna) do not use aborted human fetal tissue in the design, development or production of the vaccines.<sup>1</sup><sup>2</sup>
- The current FDA-approved COVID-19 vaccines have been *tested* using human fetal cell lines (as are many other medicines, such as the MMR and polio vaccines, as well as treatments for HIV, Parkinson's and diabetes), but the vaccines themselves do not contain any aborted fetal cells.<sup>3</sup>
- Many remaining COVID-19 vaccines in development do use human fetal cell lines and are therefore considered "ethically controversial" (for instance, the UK-approved Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine as well as the one from Janssen/Johnson & Johnson).

### **COVID-19 Vaccines and the Synod**

- The Synod in convention has repeatedly adopted resolutions supporting the sanctity of human life and opposing abortion (e.g., 2019 Resolution 3-02A, 2010 Resolution 6-02A, 2007 Resolution 6-02, 2004 Resolution 6-04).
- The Synod in convention has not officially adopted a resolution concerning the use of vaccines developed from or tested using fetal cell lines.
- The absence of an official Synod stance does not impact an individual's ability to seek a religious or personal belief exemption from vaccine requirements. In many states, religious exemptions from vaccine requirements can be obtained by individuals on the basis of conscientious objection.
- Complete consensus does not exist in the pro-life community at-large on the reception of vaccines developed from or tested using fetal cell lines (e.g., the debates within Roman Catholic circles).<sup>4</sup>
- The Commission on Theology and Church Relations has published no report or opinion on vaccines. It has discussed the possibility of addressing it pursuant to 2019 Resolution 11-01A ("To Give Guidance and Encourage Action on Beginning -of-Life Issues"), but work on that has not begun.

### What We Can Say

- The Synod remains steadfastly committed to the sanctity of human life and supportive of those institutions and individuals advocating for the unborn.
- Genuine concerns for life exist on both sides of the COVID-19 vaccination question: concern for the use of aborted fetal cells in the design, development, production and testing of vaccines, as well as concern for the physical well-being of one's neighbor endangered by the virus.
- There is no official Synod position on the use of COVID-19 vaccines (as such positions are ordinarily expressed through a resolution of the Synod in convention).
- Christians should respect the consciences of one another on a question where Scripture and the Synod have not spoken expressly.
- Members of the Synod and Synod congregations are encouraged to:
  - Educate themselves about the vaccines;
  - Consult with trusted health care providers, clergy and those who may be impacted by their decision; and
  - Act on the basis of informed conscience as to receiving the vaccine.

### Lent begins on February 17 with Ash Wednesday Service

### **at 7:00 pm.** (with Holy Communion and Live-Streamed)



# During Lent we prepare our hearts to receive our crucified and risen Lord by...

- Decorating the church using violet. Violet, the color of royalty and repentance, is the color
  - for Lent. In biblical times, violet dye was very expensive and could only be purchased by royalty or the very rich. The people of God our His royal priesthood (1 Peter 2:8-9). We decorate the church in the royal color of violet for our times of repentance – turning away from our sins and turning toward Christ for His mercy and forgiveness.
- No longer singing Alleluia. Alleluia is a Hebrew word that means "Praise the Lord." It appears often in the Psalms and is a joyous expression of faith in God. During Lent, we do not use this joyous response in order to focus on our need for repentance and faith.
- No longer singing the Gloria in Excelsis. Just as in Advent, so in Lent we give up singing the joyous Hymn of Praise. We do this to focus our worship on repentance.

Lent is a season that has a number of interesting customs:

Ash Wednesday and the Imposition of Ashes. Lent always begins 40 weekdays before Easter on Ash Wednesday. The name comes from the ancient custom of the imposition of ashes. The pastor dips his thumb into some ashes (traditionally made from the palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday) and

marks an ashy cross on each person's forehead while saying, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." This custom uses the biblical image of ashes (Job 42:6) to remind us

**WORSHIP** that we, too, shall die and therefore need forgiveness from Jesus.

- Fasting. Fasting is giving up eating at a particular meal or time in order to devote that time to prayer and meditation on the Word of God. Jesus directed that His disciples would fast (Matthew 6:16-18), and the Small Catechism says that fasting is "fine outward training" before taking the Lord's Supper. Many Christians use Lent as a special time of fasting especially on Fridays in remembrance of Good Friday when Jesus died on the cross.
- Giving something up for Lent. It's similar to fasting, except instead of a meal a person might "give up" any favorite item: a toy, television, desserts, etc. The idea behind giving something up for Lent is to be reminded to pray, to study God's Word, and to think of Jesus' sacrifice when you miss the thing that you have given up.
- Midweek services. Many churches observe Lent with special midweek services. These extra times of worship during the week help us to hear God's Word and prepare us to observe Holy Week and celebrate Easter.

### From the Principal's Desk
